

Norris inquest findings released

POLICE and paramedics have come under scrutiny as the inquest showed for most of the time before the senior paramedic entered the dock, he and his colleague did not

red during the incident at McDonalds was later found to be faulty.

In the report, the coroner recommended NSW Police continue to investigate why the fault had not been detected. He was also concerned that only one officer transported Mr Norris to the station when policy states an observer also should have been in the vehicle.

The coroner also had an issue with the fact Mr Norris' safety to be held in the dock was not assessed by the police officer present nor were the paramedics asked to examine him. However given Mr Norris' behaviour prior to arriving the station, the coroner accepted police and paramedics were waiting to ensure he was in a calmer state before removing his restraints to examine him.

He recommended CCTV footage from the charge room be incorporated into police training curriculum.
