



Competitive chess has never been so appealing. Enter Beth Harmon (Anya Taylor-Joy), orphaned from childhood due to her mother's suicide and a neglectful father. At a dreary and regimented orphanage, she becomes addicted to horse tranquilliser medicine. She begins playing chess with the resident groundskeeper, Mr Shaibel (Bill Camp), and the rest is (UMMJcbU) \]ghcfm 6UgYX cb K UhYf HYj ]gD%, ' novel of the same name, the on-screen adaptation follows Beth as she experiences the trials and tribulations of American high school while simultaneously perusing a serious career in competitive chess. The series, later on, employs feminist rhetoric to examine the social and political landscape of the 1960s, with great emphasis on the pre-conceived role and talent of women at the time, making it relevant in feminist discourse to this day due to its alluding to how Beth is perceived and received due to her gender, evident especially in the beginning of her career. Throughout the series Beth battles addiction, developing social dynamics, a co-dependant relationship with her adoptive mother during her rise to being the greatest player of her time. Both personally, and professionally, Beth dedicates her life to chess, due to this throughout the series, the viewer develops a greater understanding of the emotional pressures of the young star, contradictory to her glamorous fashion and generally immaculate appearance.
